The themes on which I've recently written and those on which I'm currently writing pertain directly to the contemporary student movement's call for decolonization of universities, systems of knowledge, and the means by which they are communicated and learned. By way of content, such considerations involve thinking through thought from the Global South not simply as a geopolitical or geo-epistemic concern but also through addressing the anxieties of intersubjective engagement with ideas and their purveyors once thought non-existent at best and illicit at worst. A recent exemplar is my study What Fanon Said: A Philosophical Introduction to His Life and Thought and earlier ones ranged from Existentia Africana to An Introduction to Africana Philosophy. In the works are writings addressing what I've called shifting the geography of reason and also a turn beyond the decolonization of knowledge to that of norms. It is with those considerations that the course of seminar conversations and readings will issue forth through a series of "what is..." type questions.
